Looking Back with Butch Spyridon, Nashville CVC

Shares Memories, Lessons Learned from Illustrious 32-Year Career

It's the swan song for the man who has long captained the destination-marketing organization in Music City.

As Butch Spyridon approaches retirement from the Nashville CVC (NCVC)—a departure that will take place at the end of June—he can look back on a fruitful career with the organization spanning 32 years. For most of that time, the 68-year-old industry leader has held the title of CEO; he also served as President before 2022, when that role was transferred to his successor, Deana Ivey.

After he joined the NCVC in 1991, Spyridon quickly learned it would be an uphill battle trying to assert the organization's role as chief marketer in Tennessee's capital city. The NCVC had been subser-



vient to Gaylord Opryland, which operated a huge hotel, theater, and theme park and had far more money to spend than the NCVC. Spyridon said it was a "rude awakening" for him.

"Just because I had a title, it didn't mean squat," he said in an interview with *USAE*. "They were in control, and they didn't want any help. They had built the leisure and tourism industry and convention industry there, and they did whatever they wanted. It was eye-opening for me."

Spyridon presented a plan of action during his first 90 days to the seven-member commission that oversaw the NCVC, but the commission balked at his intentions.

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Memories and Lessons: Favorite Stories Regarding Butch

As the head of the Nashville CVC (NCVC) for more than a generation, Butch Spyridon has unequivocally become Music City's front man.

As many of the guitar slingers and vocalists who've passed through Tennessee's capital during his tenure are instantly known by a single name; nobody asks: "Butch,who?" in the meetings community. With his retirement approaching friends and peers

When Spyridon pushed back, one of the commission members said they should just give him "enough rope to hang himself."

"My answer was: 'Perfect—that's all I'm asking for," said Spyridon, who was inducted into the Events Industry Council's Hall of Leaders last year. "If what I'm proposing doesn't work, you won't have to ask me to leave; I'll find my way out."

Spyridon acknowledged, however, the NCVC wasn't offering a lot of value at the time. The organization's sales team had to be rebuilt and expanded so the NCVC could deliver more leads and support for the community.

"That's when we hunkered down and reorganized, and we began to produce," Spyridon said. "I thought if we booked a lot of business and were collaborative we'd get a seat at the table."

That turned out to be the case. Today, Gaylord Opryland is owned by Ryman Hospitality Properties, and Spyridon says the relationship has never been better. Although the NCVC has sparred with ownership over the Music City Center, Spyridon says both have flourished.

The opening of the Music City Center was Spyridon's hardest-fought accomplishment. The project lasted 14 years from first conversation to ribbon-cutting, as the NCVC navigated its way through the tenure of a mayor who wasn't supportive; the objections from Gaylord Opryland, which saw the facility as a competitor; and general "not in my backyard" sentiment from some residents.

"I'm not a very patient person," said Spyridon. "Having to learn that big things take a long time but are worth it if you do it right was tough. We had multiple monumental hurdles to clear."

Eventually, those hurdles were cleared. The Music City Center opened its doors in May 2013 and will soon celebrate its 10th anniversary. Spyridon says it has been a boon for Nashville over the

years, even bailing the city out with surplus funds during COVID.

"I can't find the critics anymore; they're nowhere to be found," Spyridon said. "So when people say a city doesn't benefit from the hospitality industry, we're a shining example of that's not true. Done right, these things benefit everybody."

Perhaps Spyridon's fondest memory involves the Houston Oilers moving to Nashville in the late 1990s. The NCVC was deeply involved in the multi-year

process to land a National Football League team for the city, a huge undertaking that also involved a political campaign to get the move passed by referendum. In 1999, the team played its first game as the Tennessee Titans.

"Just to sit back and realize out of nowhere this unassuming, unsuspecting city became an NFL city," Spyridon said. "That was a game-changing, beyond rewarding moment. The Titans gave me field passes so, looking up at a packed house roaring, it was the ultimate satisfaction."

The team's first game also marked a very special occasion for Spyridon: the first date between him and his wife, Sunny. The pair have been married for 21 years.

The Titans also achieved something extremely unlikely in their inaugural season: a Super Bowl appearance. Although they fell to the Rams (then of St. Louis) by a score of 23-16, the fledgling franchise immediately earned respect around the league. And much like the Titans in that game, Spyridon sees himself and his city as an underdog making its mark.

"The city was always competing under long odds," said Spyridon. "It became we're going to use this as motivation and assume we don't have a chance as to whatever we're doing, so we have to outwork everybody, and we can't take anything for granted."

Of course, not every venture has been successful. For example, the NCVC ultimately failed last year in its pursuit of hosting the FIFA World Cup in 2026, an effort that was stymied when the organization couldn't say whether the game would be played in the existing Nissan Stadium or a newly built, domed facility the city planned to construct.

But even an experience like that can teach you a lesson in staying motivated but humble, said Spyridon, who will start a two-year contract as a strategic consultant for the NCVC upon retirement.

"Having an underdog mentality, staying hungry, being transparent, always being mindful that results matter, giving away the credit, and taking responsibility when there are hiccups, those things lessons I learned are how I was able to survive 32 years here," said Spyridon. "These are a huge part of how you survive in this industry."

Nashville CVC Resurrecting Historic Black Music Venue

In 1963 a young, Black guitarist Nashvillians called "Marbles" strolled into Club Baron. You may know him as Jimi Hendrix and he was about to lose a duel. More on that to come.

Hendrix wasn't the only legend to grace the club's stage with Etta James, B.B. King, Ray Charles, Muddy Waters, Little Richard and Fats Domino amongst those also appearing at the heralded Jefferson Street venue, now home to Elks Lodge #1102.

A staple of the once pulsating Jefferson Street music scene – described by the Nashville CVC (NCVC) as the city's premiere live music corridor for Black artists – Club Baron and its neighboring joints have sat silently for roughly 50 years. Today the Elks/Club Baron stands alone, boasting the lone performance stage of the 11 existing during the Jefferson Street's golden age.

But now, the NCVC is leading an effort to not only preserve the building but also revive Club Baron's rightful stature as a place for musicians to continue to shine in Music City. More than \$300,000 has been raised.

"Renovating the Elks Lodge and former home of Club Baron was a project of passion and branding," said Butch Spyridon, CEO, NCVC. "If we can't protect and preserve our musical heritage, we have no business proclaiming ourselves as Music City. Fortunately, the Elks Club and the community agreed."

WKRN, an ABC affiliate in Nashville reported a new roof, floors, stage, and bathrooms featured amongst the renovations. The NCVC said in 2021, the property was included on Historic Nashville's "Nashville Nine," a list of history-filled properties that are at the highest risk to disappear from the community.

Spyridon was the front man for an education and fundraising campaign. Working with policymakers and other civic leaders, he also raised awareness via speaking engagements and media interviews.


Hendrix had a residency at the Del Morocco club and worked around Nashville, which he credited as being the place where he really developed and honed his guitar playing proficiency, the Tennessee Department of Tourist Development noted.

Trading licks, Jones is said to have won the six-string showdown, partly because Hendrix was still developing his genre-shaking sound and partly because Jones had the more powerful amplifier, the NCVC said.

"I told him the next day, man he didn't do bad, it's just that I was louder than he was," Jones told Gibson Guitars. "So, that's the shootout between me and Jimi Hendrix."

Today, the duel's commemorated with a mural painted by Dough Joe and Yusef Hubb on the side of the Elks Lodge.
